

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

December is a difficult month for members of a Liturgical Church. A Liturgical Church follows a calendar that is independent of the culture's secular calendar. Sometimes the secular and the liturgical are in synch (ie: Halloween/All Saints Day) and sometimes the two do not line up at all (ie: Christmas). When there is harmony it is easy to affirm a liturgical worship style. When there is discord a choice has appreciate is that to be made: do members follow the rhythm of the liturgical year or do they follow the secular customs? To phrase it am in the world but another way, how much should the Church let the culture dictate its worship patterns?

There is a radio station in South Bend that switches over to constant Christmas music Thanksgiving weekend. When I lived in Colorado, one radio station celebrated the 12 Days of Christmas beginning on December 12th. (The 12 Days of Christmas begin on December 25th) There are numerous Christmas parties to attend: both company sponsored and private through the first three weeks of December. It seems like the whole world is celebrating Christmas and the Liturgical Church hasn't caught on to the festivities. It plods along with the Season of Advent and doesn't get into the Christmas spirit until the rest of society is taking down the decorations and putting away the Christmas music.

I too feel the tension between the

Liturgical Calendar and our culture's practices concerning Christmas. There are times our being out of synch makes me uncomfortable. What I've come to this tension

reminds me that I

not of the world. The Church calendar asks me to prepare for a celebration, to make ready my heart to receive the gift of a Savior. I hear the challenging words of The Baptist, "Repent!" and I'm forced to examine my life. It would be much easier to skip Advent and get right to the feel-good Season of Christmas. Doing so would also skip over the reason and need for a Messiah to come into the world. We wouldn't have to focus on sin, on our need to amend our ways, on the reasons Jesus was born in the first place.

I invite you to consider being in the world but not of the world this Advent Season. Attend the Christmas parties, decorate your homes according to your traditions, and then on Sunday morning be reminded that the Church and the culture are not always in harmony. There is a lesson for us to learn as we live through the discord.

Elaine Chartrand - Who are the members of the worship committee?

Sandy Pliley suggested that a list of committee members be passed out during church and available on a regular basis.

Wayne Schuermann - Since your coming you have been pushing towards this.

Pastor replied that he has been working towards this. We had a trial period; during the Easter season through the first day of Pentecost, communion was served each Sunday. No one complained about it then.

Sandy Warren -It is up to each one of us personally whether we commune or not.

Barb Morgan - My concern is that it becomes an automatic process rather than a spiritual process.

Debbie Kroening - Would there be enough members of the altar guild to support it each Sunday?

Pastor - it was suggested that the Altar Guild work out alternatives to the scheduling.

Pat Nose - Will we still have seasons that we will not have communion?

Pastor - No. However, the Wednesday services during Lent and Advent would not be communion

Maria - Could you repeat the questions?

Sandy Schuermann - Wayne and I have experience with that. The concern of Barb Morgan is real. It can become rote. Not necessarily the human heart, but the human brain.

Staffing by the Altar Guild is a concern.

Sharon Schmidt - Communion is right with God, I've asked His forgiveness.... At times we may not have our hearts right. If so, I may not go to communion. No one needs to judge us if we do not go to communion. If we are not ready, we just stay seated.

Sandy Schuermann - Do we have enough people to serve communion?

Pastor - Yes

Ed - We've gone back and forth on a particular topic. There are times I cannot always be here. If I miss, I know I can go to communion the next time I am here.

Nan - As co-chairperson of worship committee, you need to know that communion would be offered each Sunday. However, you need to have the mind set that your neighbor may choose to not go to communion and that is ok.

Sharon Schmidt - I knew a lady one time. When communion came up, she said that while you are waiting to go up, pray for each person going up to communion. Make sure you are right in your heart with all in your life.

Pastor - speaking as "me", when I came here, I was told that people do not like change. Are you aware of how many things have changed in worship? A lot of the wordings have changed, due mostly to copyright. We've introduced the Kyrie without the Hymn of Praise. We have been making the seasons more specific. We are looking at different liturgies that have similarities to what have been used for the last ten years. We just want the service not to be static. My door is open. I think this is a victory that we had such a great discussion.

Barb Morgan - everything in our life today has changed. If the change is meaningful, then it needs to be supported. We are so afraid to change things in our church, but is that God changing?

Marty Tallman - we've been talking about how this as a church. When visitors come, it would be nice for them to come to the table with us.

Chuck Wilson - I agree with Marty. Everything I have heard here today is a personal preference. We can make our own choices and yet welcome all to the Lord's table each Sunday.

Elaine Chartrand and Shari Schmidt stated that Scrip money is restricted for use on building and grounds. They did not want to change the precedent. Discussion that church funds should not be used to subsidize cost of party. Question called.

What Does This Mean to Me?

This regular newsletter feature—playing on Luther's famous line in the Small Catechism—is designed to help us all better understand why things happen as they do at Peace. The worship committee actively seeks feedback or questions from congregation members confused or concerned about worship practices.

"Why don't we sing Christmas Carols beginning the first Sunday in December?"

Advent has been described as "the Season that gets in the way of Christmas." It is that difficult time of year when a congregation is asked to put the brakes on Christmas celebrations; it seems artificial and contrived. The season serves as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas as well as the return of Jesus at the second coming. The lessons the first Sunday of Advent have a dark, ominous tone as they point to the tribulation before Jesus' return. Advent means "coming;" it is a season anticipating Jesus' Second Coming as well as His birth in Bethlehem. The second Sunday in Advent presents John the

Baptist and his message of repentance. Though not an uplifting, joyous message, it is an important message for us to hear.

We do not sing Christmas Carols the first two weeks of Advent mainly because of the lesson's focus. Our Sr. Pastor and Organist strive to



match congregational song to the themes present in the biblical texts. We also don't sing Christmas Carols the first two weeks of Advent in an attempt to differentiate the seasons: Advent and Christmas are two distinct and separate seasons in the Church's calendar. Each has its own focus. On the third Sunday of Advent one Christmas Carol is introduced as the focus of the lessons switches to Jesus' earthly ministry. On the fourth Sunday of Advent, two Christmas Carols are sung to ease the transition into the upcoming Festival Season of the Nativity.

In an attempt to let Advent be Advent, we sing Advent Songs and delay the introduction of Christmas Carols till later in the season.

Come and sing the Joyous Light Vespers service at 7 p.m. December 5, 12, and 19. This year we will look at the birth of Christ through the lens of Hope, Hero, and Joyful Presence.

The deadline to return your items is Dec. 16.

Let us never forget that we are responsible for helping those who are in need.

HATS - GLOVES - SHARING THE LOVE OF CHRIST

We have almost reached our goal of 350 hats for our Hat and Glove ministry, but we are still in desperate need of gloves. Please consider helping us out by purchasing gloves when you are out shopping for Christmas gifts. We will take all kinds of gloves...Dollar Store gloves to ski gloves.... We are grateful for all.

This ministry began in 2011... a 16-year-old girl felt that God was asking her to help 610 elementary children at the school next to her church. The church provided food for needy families at the school ... she began to feel God working in her life ...He was urging her to make a difference in the lives of these children. She thought, "If they do not have food...they probably do not have warm winter hats either". So she began to crochet hats... soon her teenage friends...then their moms...then the members of her church began to help.

When the ladies at Peace heard about this, they began to do the same. Peace began with a contribution of 40 hats to that program in 2011, but has continued to produce hats and gloves every year since then for needy children in Berrien County. All told ... women from Peace have produced nearly 2,500 hats in this program. Most of them have been handmade. Over the years we added gloves to the program.

We have contributed to several schools and organizations over the years, but have entered into a regular partnership with Lybrook Elementary School



in Eau Claire.

We will deliver our hats in mid-December. As the body of Christ we are asked to use our God-given gifts and talents to help those in need and make the world a better place to live.
